## Strategic Plan for Education & Outreach 2016 - 2019 Implementation V. 1.0

Over the last year, the LWAF Education and Conservation Committee has been working on an early childhood, K-12 and postsecondary education plan.

Our goal is to develop new programs and services to better address the emerging educational needs of the greater Maple Valley community. Beginning in 2016, we will measure data and monitor criteria to determine the most successful outcome for our kids.

#### **Proposed Strategies:**

-Enhance quality and deepen the impact of the Arboretum's existing school programs in support of Washington STEM, Common Core standards and Envirothon.

-Expand school-day, after school and summer educational experiences, leveraging partnerships with schools, youth development programs, scouts, environmental groups, home-schoolers, arts and community-based organizations.

-Explore ways to collaborate and deepen strategic partnerships with plant

societies, wildlife groups, college and university programs and others who teach about plants, landscapes, environmental stewardship and the history of our bio-region.

-Capitalize on bird sanctuary and wildlife aspects of the Arboretum through programming, promotion and partnerships with related organizations in South King County.

-Better meet the growing demand for adult education classes, workshops and events related to botanicals and gardening, along with other topics that impact gardening, such as bee-keeping. -Develop guidelines for our existing special events (Hellebore Tea, Fuchsia Festival, Plant Sales, Flower shows, etc.), including how our desired purpose for fundraising connects to and supports continuing education as well as the Arboretum's mission.

## Famous Botanical Book on Display at 50th Anniversary Fuchsia Festival

A 164-year-old copy of the book, *The Rhododendrons of Sikkim- Himalaya* by Joseph Dalton Hooker, M.D. was on display during the 4<sup>th</sup> annual **Fuchsia Festival** at Lake Wilderness Arboretum Friday, September 11.

On loan from the University of Washington Botanic Gardens Elisabeth C. Miller Library in honor of the Arboretum's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration, the book once belonged to Dr. Frank Mossman who, along with Mr. Britt Smith, amassed one of the largest collections of deciduous western azaleas (Rhododendron occidentale) in the world and is now the Arboretum's signature Smith-Mossman Western Azalea Garden.

"Joseph Hooker is one of the botanists that published a classification of the Pacific Rhododendron, the Washington State flower," LAWF board member **Bob Dunning** says. "He succeeded his father as the director of the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew in 1865, whereupon he engaged in the politics necessary to safeguard the future of the gardens. Smith and Mossman were part of an equally long tradition of plant exploration in the Pacific Northwest."

The Fuchsia Festival fundraiser also featured the arboretum's fuchsias, refreshments, hors d'oeuvres and music from the **Maple Valley Youth Symphony Orchestra.** 



#### City Addresses Recent Thefts & Vandalism at the Arboretum

In response to recent thefts and vandalism at Lake Wilderness Arboretum, the City of Maple Valley has made several recommendations to address the problem of security for the property and surrounding area.

City Parks Director **Greg Brown** gave a presentation to the Lake Wilderness Arboretum Board of Directors (LWAF) about the master plan for Maple Valley parks, including Lake Wilderness Arboretum and offers a list of suggestions from both the police chief and the city detective:

- Increase patrols and police presence in the area
- Increase nighttime lighting throughout the grounds
- Improve sight lines to more remote locations by pruning vegetation
- Widen the service road behind the Arboretum nursery so patrol cars could drive through on patrol
- Install automatic gates, more cameras and monitoring signage
- Call 911 on a "non-emergency" basis if anything unusual is seen

In the months to follow, the LWAF will continue to discuss ways to implement more protection measures on Arboretum grounds, including the forest area, trails, the nursery, hoop house and storage buildings.

## Local Families Celebrate the Season First Community Harvest Festival

The first **Community Harvest Festival** took place at Lake Wilderness Arboretum on Saturday, September 26.

Children participated in nature play activities, digging, swinging, making mud pies, building forts and exploring the Tribal Life Trail with their parents.

Guests also had the chance to see the Arboretum's new children's area, a portion of the forest that is currently being developed alongside Little Sparrows Forest School.

Special attraction **Alleyoop!** shared folk stories in the meadow, and community partners volunteered their time introducing children to local animal friends. A few local vendors offered hand-crafted children's items and small batch canned goods, and caramel apples topped off the day.

Hosted by **Greenplay Cooperative,** a non-profit educational organization, the event was the organization's first fundraiser, with all registration donations benefiting the Family Scholarship Fund.

"Our Board of Directors, parents and friends of Little Sparrows are all excited to see such a huge turnout," Co-founder and President **Sarah Schumacher** says. "Connecting local families to the nourishing beauty of the Arboretum, bringing young children and their families together to celebrate nature and the changing of seasons, is what we do best."

"The workshop provided instruction on achieving my signature soft focus-dreamy feel in pictures, as well as how to achieve a sharp image," Sally says. "Art offered a lot of oneon-one help to the participants with their cameras." Sally is known for taking stunning close-up photographic images of nature, and the teaching team received great feedback from the participants.

"Photography is art and everyone has to find what speaks to them. I wanted our photographers to find their own way in choosing what type of image they wanted to shoot."

Sally is planning to teach an advanced macro photography workshop and a series of workshops on garden photography at the Arboretum in the future.
